A residential visit to Derwent Hill is not a "trip" or optional extra but has become a fundamental part of the curriculum that we offer at Hudson Road.

In this very disadvantaged community, one of the most limiting factors for pupils can be their poverty of experience- the limits placed on children because they have not experienced at first hand the world outside Sunderland, the landscape of the UK, their history and heritage or even for some to find a sense of belonging and community in a new country. A residential visit to Derwent Hill gives our pupils all of that and much more.

Pupils tell us they feel more confident and have a more positive attitude.

"It made me more determined to give things a try and to go out of my comfort zone."

"I was able to do activities that I did not even think I could do and I learnt about myself."

Many return with a love of the outdoors and a real interest in geography and the environment. Only two of the children we took this year had ever visited the Lake District before- all of them are now keen to return.

We are incredibly grateful for the support of the Friends of Derwent Hill to help us make this residential possible. We subsidise the visit as much as we can from our budget as we want it to be accessible for all of the pupils however, we rely on the extra help from the Friends of Derwent Hill for some of our most disadvantaged families (and they are often the children who benefit the most from the visit).

Last year we were able to apply for and were granted a bursary for one of our Y6 pupils to attend Derwent Hill with his class. Without the bursary he would have been unable to attend.

The pupil moved to the North-East during the autumn term of Year 6 as a result of domestic abuse that his mother and his family had experienced. They had to move from their home area as there was a risk to their lives should they have stayed. This meant a massive change for him and his family - leaving friends, school, and extended family behind. Prior to joining us, because of the abuse at home his attendance was less than 20%. This was a new start for him, and we soon began to see him settle in and make new friends, however he was shy, reserved, and cautious around his peers and adults. Many in his class had already booked to attend a Derwent Hill residential week following their SATs in the summer term of Y6. He asked about being able to go but was fraught when told the cost, as he knew that because of having to set up a new home and his mum being on her own on benefits they would be unable to attend. We approached his mum and suggested we could apply for a bursary and would ensure that he could go - she was overwhelmed by this act of kindness towards her and the family, giving permission for us to apply.

When we were able to tell the pupil that he could go to Derwent Hill - the transformation was massive - from not making eye contact he now meet your gaze, he began to talk about the future and his friendships deepened with his peers and adults in school. During and following the visit his confidence exploded and we began to see him reach his potential not only academically but socially and emotionally.

Thank you to the Friends of Derwent Hill for making bursaries available to those in need, you cannot imagine the difference it makes to a young child's life both now and undoubtedly in the future.
